

note from the president

t's hard to believe that my first semester as president is coming to an end. The past few months have been full of exciting improvements and changes including record enrollment. The College has started a period of strategic planning which has included surveying many of our major stakeholders (students, staff, faculty and alumni) to get their opinions on what Ranken needs to be successful in the future. We have also formed several planning teams to concentrate on certain areas such as education, finances, recruitment, additional programs and campus expansion. These teams have been working diligently to help determine how best to position Ranken for the next 100 years.

The College has also experienced a big change in culture with the addition of Walker Hall and more than 70 students living on campus. Walker Hall is now a member of the Residents Hall Association (RHA) which is a representative organization that encourages residents to play an active role in residence halls through service, educational and social programming and leadership opportunities. Walker Hall now has officers in place and residents have become an active and integral part of campus life at Ranken. They have taken part in community programs such as "Hoodies for the Homeless," which helped donate winter clothing to the homeless in the surrounding community and have also developed several social events for residents such as movie nights, cooking classes and "dance offs."

With students becoming more active in campus life, an intramurals flag football league was started this fall and Ranken held its first annual Pumpkin Bowl championship game in November. Jeremy Sutton, Ranken's director of residential life, also has plans for a pool league this winter and a softball league in the spring. With the addition of outdoor basketball courts to campus, students also have plans to start a basketball league next year.

Ranken will be officially opening our new Fabrication and Welding lab located in the Mary Ann Lee Technology Center in January 2010. This new space will not only offer our Industrial Technology students more up-to-date equipment and lab space but will also be the home for our new Fabrication and Welding Technology program which will begin classes in the spring semester.

As you can see, the College is engaged in an exciting period of positive change and growth. We invite you to visit campus and see first-hand how Ranken can not only offer superior education and training, but now a full campus experience.



n Monday, October 19, a Customer Direct Call Center opened on campus. Located in room 309 of the Gray building, the call center employs Ranken students to offer desktop support in the evenings. The company recruited five of Ranken's Information Technology students who were in at least their second semester of the program. The students were provided with more than 40 hours of training at the company's Chesterfield office and have the option to work on campus or in Chesterfield. The call center is open Sunday through Wednesday, 6:00 p.m. to 12:00 a.m. Students who complete the training and a successful evaluation at the end of the semester will receive three credit hours on their transcript for a course called Help Desk Specialist.

These outsourced services include customer care, multi-tier technical support and contact center software. On October 7, TRiO hosted an event for all Ranken students called "Stepping Stones to Success." The event was held on the Finney lawn and they invited students to attend to see what the TRiO program is all about. The event consisted of games, volleyball and an obstacle course. During the obstacle course, one person was blindfolded and the other participant gave verbal directions on how to safely complete the course. The idea was to show students how much easier it is to complete

a difficult task when you have assistance from someone who can see the obstacles ahead.

Late in October, the office held a Halloween open house for the entire student body that included food, games and giveaways. TRiO offers workshops throughout the year on topics such as financial aid, time management, study skills and stress management. They also host College fairs for those involved in the program who would like to further their education after leaving Ranken.

The TRiO Student Support Services program is a federally-funded program designed to help college students be successful by providing extra support, guidance and various activities. Students must meet certain requirements to be eligible for these services. In order to participate in the program, students must meet one or more of the following requirements:

- Need financial assistance to attend Ranken
- Suffer from any learning, mental or physical disability
- Are the first member of their family to go to college
- Speak a language other than English as their native language

CARSTAR Opens New Classroom

n February 2009, the Metro St. Louis CARSTAR Group formed a partnership with the Automotive Collision Repair program and generously donated \$35,000. The majority of the money was allocated to remodeling and furnishing a classroom in Rodenheiser that now bears the company's name. Room R211, now designated as the new CARSTAR classroom, is equipped with smart boards and other essential 21st century learning tools. The remaining funds will be used for other equipment needed to improve the ACR program at Ranken.

In October, the CARSTAR business group held their monthly meeting in this new classroom on campus. Two local CARSTAR stores are owned by Ranken graduates, and many shops employ Ranken interns.

"Ranken has the best auto body repair program in the area," said Kerry Woodson II, chairman of the Metro St. Louis CARSTAR group. "We look forward to bringing more Ranken interns, apprentices and graduates into the CARSTAR family."

"Ranken produces top-notch, well-qualified individuals for our field and we are excited about the opportunities this partnership will provide to both CARSTAR and Ranken," said Woodson.

Ranken will host an official grand opening of the room with a ribboncutting ceremony to be held on January 28, 2010.

New Fabrication and Welding Lab to Open

Beginning in spring 2010, Ranken will offer a new Fabrication and Welding Technology program. The program will include foundation courses in flux core, gas tungsten arc welding, gas metal arc welding and stick, as well as specialties in structural fabrication, chassis fabrication and advanced welding techniques. Students will now be able to decide on what welding career goals they have before a training path is determined.

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Ranken Community Development Corporation (RCDC) To Complete Two More Homes

Before the end of last semester, the RCDC program was able to begin excavation of two new single-family home sites on Evans Avenue. These two homes are part of Phase I of a community that will be called Sam Moore Estates.

At the start of the fall semester, second year carpentry students began the framing of floors and walls and in early October, added the roof trusses. Students from plumbing, HVACR and electrical also participated in the rough-in phase. Throughout the semester the homes began to really take shape with the addition of the

roof, windows, doors, siding and the exterior NovaBrik.

An open house was held on November 28 so that students, staff,

faculty, family and community members could see first hand the work that Ranken students have accomplished.

Beginning next semester, carpentry students will begin the interior work with the addition of dry wall, installation of cabinets, trim and flooring. HVACR, plumbing and electrical students will also finish their work inside the homes so that they are ready to be sold to two area families. Carpentry students will also have the opportunity to take part in the digging and pouring of the foundations of Phase II of the development.

RCDC recently received \$150,000

"Jerseyville has sent many talented students to Ranken in past years," Davenport explained. "This is just a small way for us to help train future Ranken students."

S-STEM Sponsors Hold Meet and Greet

ast May, Ranken was awarded a four-year \$600,000 National Science Foundation grant which provides scholarships to prospective new students who wish to attend Ranken and major in one of four areas: Architectural Technology, Industrial Technology, Information Technology or Precision Machining Technology. The program is titled the S-STEM (Scholarship for Science, Technology, Engineering, and Manufacturing) and has two main goals: one, to increase the participation of academically talented, financially disadvantaged students - including underrepresented groups (females and minorities) in the selected STEM related disciples at Ranken Technical College, and two, to provide student support services that enable the Ranken S-STEM recipients to persist through completion of an associate or bachelor's degree and to find employment in their field.

As a recipient of the scholarship, students participate in industry tours, listen to guest speakers, and volunteer eight hours towards community leadership, which could include working with Habitat for Humanity, tutoring younger kids in math and science and various other options. Once a student is awarded the scholarship, they can continue to receive it annually by meeting certain requirements such as maintaining a certain GPA and completing their community leadership hours.

Ranken has developed a S-STEM team which consists of faculty and staff. Each year this team will develop a new theme and this year's theme is Leadership. All tours and guest speakers will be geared toward this theme. Next year's theme is based on teamwork. Missy Borchardt, an instructor in the Architectural Technology program is heading up the S-STEM team.

With help from generous donors, Ranken is able to offer students more than 50 scholarship, grant and loan options.

"I am very excited about this program," said Borchardt. "This is a great opportunity for students to benefit financially AND professionally. Some of these students will receive up to \$10,000 in scholarship assistance each year!"

During the luncheon the team also went over what is required of each student every semester to be able to continue receiving their scholarship money. These things include eight hours of community leadership, monthly meetings with team leaders, attendance at industry tours, and sessions with guest speakers. A meet and greet luncheon will be held during the first month of every semester.

SkillsUSA Scholarship

Each year SkillsUSA holds competitions to identify many of the most talented high school students in various vocational areas. Ranken Technical College provides scholarships for students demonstrating exceptional achievement in these competitions.





Dan Martin Automotive Maintenance Technology, 1970

an Martin's Ranken experience began like many others; with a referral from an alumnus. Martin's father, Matt Martin, graduated from Ranken's tool and die program in 1941 and knew first hand what Ranken could offer his son. Martin took his father's advice and graduated in 1970 from the Automotive Maintenance program.

Even then, Martin remembers that Ranken had an excellent reputation and students were expected to live up to that reputation by attending class and following the rules.

Six weeks after graduation Martin was drafted into the Army where he served for two years. Almost immediately after he was discharged, he was able to find employment in a local repair shop and he attributes that to his Ranken diploma. In 1978, after several years of working in local shops, Martin noticed an employment ad in the paper to work for the United Parcel Service (UPS).

"The economy was bad at the time so when I went to UPS to complete the application there were 81 other applicants for only two open positions," said Martin. "I thought there was no way I had a chance at the job. Fortunately, because of my Ranken education and my experience, I was one of the two people hired."

After only three years in the shop at UPS, Martin was promoted into fleet management. He spent the next 24 years at the company serving in various roles. With each promotion usually came a relocation so the Martin family moved several times including Orlando, Florida, Washington, D.C. and finally to San Antonio, Texas. After more than five years at the San Antonio office, Martin was able to retire.

Martin continues to live in New Braunfels, Texas with his wife of 27 years, Pat. They have two daughters and four grandchildren. Since his retirement from UPS, he opened a corvette restoration business for vintage corvettes called, Hill Country Vettes. Martin's shop restores corvettes made from 1953-1972. Several of the cars that Martin has

restored have been on display in the National Corvette Museum in Bowling Green, Ky.

He receives restoration projects from people all over the country, as well as from Canada and Australia. Martin is also active in the local corvette club, as well as serving on the Board of Trustees for St. Jude's Ranch for Children in Boulder City, Nevada. He also presides over and attends car shows in San Antonio as well as throughout the country and can be found at swap meets from coast to coast swapping out and selling corvette parts.

"I gained more than an education during my time at Ranken," said Martin. "I matured quite a bit over those two years. I became more
